Your description is not uncommon. Often the first or even the first series are discarded. It has taken us up to four attempts to get acceptable, readable fingerprints. You could try another ink, another FBI office, or another person in the field office where you've been trying. Sometimes it is possible to scan your fingers digitally. It can work better. Good time. These include Canada, the United States, Australia, New Zealand and some Asian, South American and Central American countries. Full lists of countries and countries with visa waivers required for visas can be found online. The maximum period for passport holders outside the European Union in Europe is governed by the Schengen Agreement and is currently limited to 90 days in any six-month period (we have changed it recently from 180 days to 6 months, despite the fact that many sites report 180 days as the limit). It is important to note that the Schengen visa area must not leave for a day and return to restart the 90-day clock. If you have spent 90 days in the Schengen area, you are ready for six months. Travelers with U.S. passports should receive up-to-date information about the U.S. State Department's Schengen bulletin. According to the French Consulate in Houston, a visa is not required for short stays of up to 3 months in the Schengen State for tourism or business purposes for applicants from the following countries: Andorra*, Argentina, Brazil, Bulgaria, Canada, Chile, Cyprus, South Korea, Czech Republic, European Union* and EEA (Germany, Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Greece, Iceland, Ireland, Italy), Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Spain, the United Kingdom (until 31 December 2020, when the Brexit transition period has ended) and Sweden), Hong Kong (HKSAR only) (passport issued by MSAR only), Malta, Mexico, Monaco*, New Zealand, Poland, Romania, San Marino*, Slovakia, Slovenia, Switzerland*, Holy See*, Uruguay and the United States. Switzerland, which does not belong to the EU or the European region has had the same visitor restrictions as Schengen and is due to implement the Schengen rules together with Liechtenstein by the end of 2008) The aforementioned countries marked *do not require a visa for a long stay. Source: Consulate General of France in Houston [Note: They mean that passport holders from the above countries travelling for tourism do not have to apply for a Schengen visa because these countries have reciprocal visa agreements. You will continue to operate in accordance with the rules of the Schengen visa.] New Zealand is a special case. Safetravel.govt.nz, New Zealand has bilateral visa waiver agreements with many individual countries in the Schengen area. These visa waiver agreements allow New Zealanders to spend up to three months in the country concerned without referring to the time spent in other Schengen countries. A list of countries can be found at the link above. The exception to the 90-day Schengen visa scenario occurs when you visit the non-Schengen United Kingdom, where US, Canadian and Australian citizens are given a 6-month visa upon arrival. This visa does not apply to the Schengen area. Other countries have so-called arrival visas. These visas are purchased when you land and are placed on your visa before entering the immigration window. As a tourist, your visa tells you the expiration or date you should leave. Some visas may be valid for a long time, but your stay may end in a shorter period of time. For example, a country can grant you a tourist visa, which is good for 5 years, but that doesn't mean you can stay for 5 years. Most countries allow you to stay for 30-180 days, but you have to leave before these days are over; if your visa is good for several years, it means you can go back without having to apply for a new visa.
